A LITTLE MORE BRAMSHALL FAMILY HISTORY

Following on from last month's article:

Who was Mrs EC Statham?

Mrs EC Statham was my grandmother. Born in 1895 Elizabeth Cooper Buckley (known as Muffett) to Tom and Catherine Buckley, together with her sister Catherine (known as Kitty), home was The Elms Farm on Bramshall Road.

On 7th September 1915 she married John Henry (Harry) Statham in Bramshall Church and moved to his home, Bank Farm, Bramshall. In 1917 her father retired from farming The Elms Farm, Harry took on the tenancy and Gramdma moved back 'home'. In the following year (1918) the Loxley Estate was sold and Grandfather Harry bought The Elms Farm.

My grandparents were very involved with the village and the Church. As mixed livestock farmers they kept dairy cows, sheep, pigs and poultry. My grandfather was active in the working horse world buying young Shire horses from local farmers and either train them at home or put them out onto other farms to train. He would then sell them on as fully trained working heavy horses further afield.

The family grew with Mary born in 1916, Richard (known as Dick) born in 1920 and my father John born in 1922. I don't remember my grandfather as he died in 1958 aged 74, whereas my grandmother died in 1975 aged 81 having moved into St Mary's Mount following a stroke in the late 1960s. Even with her mobility severely affected she was always very busy at the home helping prepare meals for the residents (probably not allowed these days!) and always having a stream of family and friends visiting. At the time of her death she had six surviving grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

I assume the Parish magazine article was written in 1971, by the reference to the postal strike, and she was reminiscing about her younger life. How things have changed, the Village was a lot smaller in those days and life a lot tougher, but she still had good memories. Perhaps it puts the current limitations into perspective.

New Beginnings?

It doesn't seem that long ago that I wrote an article about New Year Resolutions and here we are in April. They say time flies when you're having fun so, maybe, despite the imposed restrictions on social activity and grave risks to health, I must have been having fun, or perhaps I'm just getting old! The new year is an ideal time for reflection; for thinking about aspects of ones' life that need improvement or changing. Well, Spring is just as good a time too as it's full of new beginnings.

Spring brings warmer temperatures because our planet is tipped at a jaunty angle as it orbits around the sun and, in the Spring months Earth gets more sunlight and warmth. St. George's Day - April 23rd

Very little is known about St. George's life, but it is thought he was a high-ranking officer in the Roman army who was killed in around AD 303. It seems that the Emperor Diocletian had St. George tortured to make him deny his faith in Christ. However, despite some of the most terrible torture even for that time, St George showed incredible courage and faith and was finally beheaded near Lydda in Palestine. His head was later taken to Rome where it was interred in the church dedicated to him.

Penny's Recipe of the Month





Ingredients:

1tbsp sunflower oil,
1lb rump steak,
1onion thinly sliced,
11oz button mushrooms thinly sliced,
2tbsp plain flour,
1/4tsp paprika.
2fl-oz brandy (optional),
1/2pint beef stock,
1tbsp Dijon mustard.
1tbsp tomato puree.
3 fl oz soured cream.
Fresh parsley roughly chopped.

After the last weekend in February I really thought Spring had come - sadly that wasn't to be. So it is back to good warming recipes. In a large frying pan heat oil and fry your beef steak but cut it into strips and fry for 4mins. Add the mushrooms and cook for a further 3mins. Stir in the flour and paprika cook for a minute stirring all the time then stir in the brandy, stock, mustard and tomato puree and bubble for 5mins. Stir the sauce from time to time until thickened add the cream and check the seasoning. Scatter over the chopped parsley and service with rice or pasta. Enjoy. Would be rude with this recipe not to enjoy a glass of red wine.
