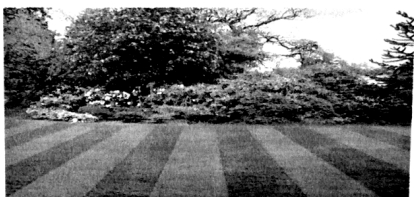

Penny's Recipe of the Month

Lemon Crunch Pie



Base:

1/4lb Digestive Biscuits,
2oz Butter,
1 level tbsp caster sugar.

Filling:

1/4pt single cream
6oz Nestle's Condensed milk.
2 large lemons finely grated rind and juice.

Finely crush the digestive biscuits. Melt the butter in a pan and add sugar - remove from heat. Mix in biscuit crumble to pan with the butter and sugar, stir well. Put mixture into a flan dish and press into shape round the base and sides with back of the spoon. Put Flan dish into a hot oven - 250deg for 8mins- remove from oven and allow to cool. Do not turn crumble base out of flan dish as it will crumble.

Mix together, cream, condensed milk in a bowl with lemon rind, and then add a little at a time the lemon juice, when mixed well pour into the flan case and chill for several hours in fridge. This lemon crunch pie will keep in fridge but needs to come out for a spell before eating so that the base of the pie won't be so hard.

HOUSEHOLD WASTE TIPS TO RE-OPEN

(Advice from Staffordshire County Council)

Staffordshire County Council closed all of its household waste recycling centres in March after the national lockdown started.

Now it has been announced that the sites will be back up and running from May 14 but strictly for 'essential use' to 'protect the public and staff from the risk of spreading infection'.

The opening times will be slightly shorter from 9am to 4pm.

Only three cars will be allowed on each site to unload with a one-in-one-out system so residents are being warned to expect delays.

Only one person will be permitted per vehicle. Where younger children can't stay at home, they will be allowed to travel in but they must stay in the car.

Anyone who is self-isolating or has COVID-19 symptoms must not visit an HWRC site.

DENTAL SERVICES IN STAFFORDSHIRE

In line with national guidance issued in response to the Covid-19 pandemic, dental practices in Staffordshire are currently closed for routine "face to face" dental appointments. People seeking help with dental problems should not visit local dental practices in person but instead contact their usual practice by phone, between the hours of 9am - 5pm, Monday to Friday, for information or advice on alternative arrangements in place. Outside normal hours or if a patient does not have a dentist, they should contact NHS 111.

A NEW LEASE OF LIFE



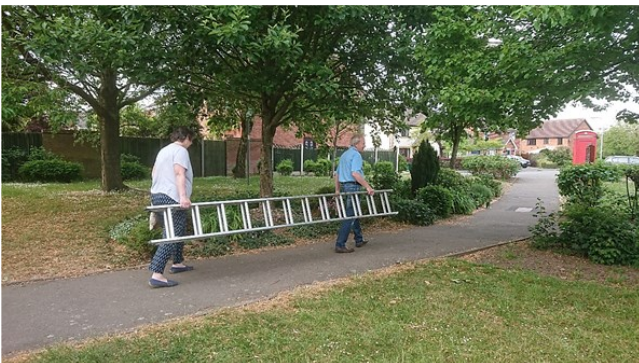
